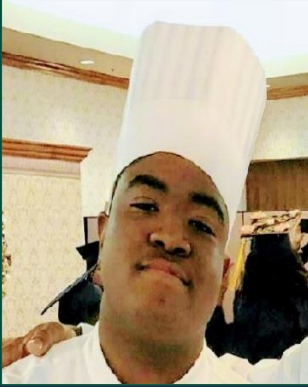


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## Alumnus Highlight

Howard Harlan



Howard Harlan, Cornerstone alumnus, is working as a chef and he is giving credit to Cornerstone for helping him achieve his dream career. Harlan, a 2015 Cornerstone alumnus, says that his mom chose Cornerstone for him because she felt it was the best option in Detroit. "I wasn't involved in any clubs or anything at my previous school, and I wasn't really doing well in school," he explains.
